Encountering Christ Our Hope

Pope Francis gave us a clear vision for the Jubilee Year of Hope (December 24, 2024-January 6, 2026): "For everyone, may the Jubilee be a moment of gratitude, personal encounter with the Lord Jesus, the 'door' of

our salvation, whom the Church is charged to proclaim always. everywhere and to all as 'our hope." (diocs.org)

Strengthening and Encouraging our Clergy, Religious, and Consecrated Life

Our deacons minister to us as Christ the Servant. They generously offer a service to the Word (proclaiming the Gospel and delivering homilies), the Altar (assisting during Mass), and to Divine Charity (their service in the world). "The spirituality of service is a spirituality of the whole Church, insofar as the whole Church, in the same way as Mary, is the 'handmaid of the Lord' (Lk 1:28), at the service of the salvation of the world. And so that the whole Church may better live out this spirituality of service, the Lord gives her a living and personal sign of His very being as servant ... In fact, with sacred ordination, he is constituted a living icon of Christ the servant within the Church." (Basic Norms for the Formation of Permanent Deacons) It must also be mentioned the important and integral role that deacons' wives play in supporting their husbands' ministry.

Women religious, or nuns, play a significant and multifaceted role in the life of the Catholic Church. They are women who have chosen to live a consecrated life in community, giving themselves completely to God and following vows of poverty, chastity, and obedience. The women religious in our diocese continue to be essential in the spreading of the Gospel, the care of the vulnerable, and the formation of new generations of faithful. Their role in the Catholic Church is one of both service and deep spiritual commitment, with a mission to live out the gospel through prayer, action and witness. We are blessed by their presence.

Sacred Heart Devotion

"According to the Popes of the last 100 years, there is no devotion more important to the life of the Church than devotion to the Heart of Jesus," theologian Dr. Robert Stackpole tells us. But why?

For Love of God. Fr. Michael Gaitley once wrote a book called <u>Consoling the Heart of Jesus</u>. That can sound like an awfully strange title, right? Jesus is God, Jesus is in Heaven. Why does He need to be consoled? And who can do it?

Father Mike does a great job explaining that, yes, Jesus' Heart needs consolation because He loves us so much that He suffers when that love is ignored, rejected, or forgotten. So, He came to us through a simple nun named St. Margaret Mary Alacoque (1647-1690), a member of the Visitation Sisters, and He asked for devotion to His Sacred Heart. This devotion would console His Sacred Heart because it would mean Catholics are saying, "I love you Jesus, and I know You love me! I know You are merciful, a God of love and mercy, not a God of fury and strict, merciless justice. Let me have mercy on You too!

Promises you can take to the bank. But He doesn't just ask us to do things. Jesus also made a whole series of extraordinary promises, as well! (The classic list of 12 promises will be included in a future bulletin.) They promise extraordinary graces to any of us who will be devoted to the Sacred Heart of Jesus, including huge graces for our families, all the grace we need to fulfill the duties of our state in life, and much, much more. But for now, let's just focus on one. It's the so-called Great Promise.
